

AN EXPLORER'S REPORT: THE HEARD ISLAND EXPEDITION

Regular Friday meeting, November 18, 2016

On MARCH 11, 2016, a team of 14 avid ham radio operators and scientists loaded their gear onto a 39-meter ocean vessel and set sail for Heard Island. Under the direction of our own Bob Schmieder, these hardy explorers headed for Heard Island, a remote island just north of Antarctica in the Eastern Indian Antarctic basin and exhibiting many of the features of Antarctica, short summer season, high



winds, glaciers and an active volcano, and with no human inhabitants. Schmieder's first expedition to Heard Island was in 1997 and for several years thereafter he had wanted to return. The objective was two-fold: to establish a ham radio station to challenge the skills of a global world of ham operators with a state-of-the-art communication station; and to find and bring back natural samples that would perhaps reveal new species of life, or new documentation of natural processes that shape the land forms on the earth's crust - in other words, pure science!

This expedition was 3 years in the making, and Schmieder was involved in all aspects of project design, team member selection, equipment and process design, funding, boat selection and finally, execution. Included among these tasks was the process of getting legal and formal permission from the Australian government, the administrator of Heard Island - not a trivial matter since the island has been declared a World Heritage Site, with all the restrictions you might expect with regard to paying a visit. - where one may or may not go, what must not be touched, and how to treat the animal life that presently lives there.

How to get to Heard Island was the first decision to be made. The ocean research vessel Braveheart, 39 meters (120 ft) long operating out of New Zealand, was selected, based on past performance, crew experience and availability. The capacity of the vessel defined the number on the team. Scheduling was based on the window of summer weather, as well as the time to assemble the equipment and the team. The illustration shows where the various participants came





from to meet in Cape Town. From there, a 12-day sail to Heard Island, 21 days there and 11 days to sail on to Freemantle, Australia, 44 days in all.





The balance of the talk included many pictures describing the features of the island. The total expedition cost was around \$500,000, and Schmieder acknowledged the many donors who had contributed to the project, either in cash or in kind. FROM THE CHAIR

Let me begin by wishing Happy Holidays to every one of you. Thanksgiving, that wonderful gathering time for family and friends, is now in our rearview mirror, but the celebrations of December are bearing down on us. I do hope that you will join your fellow NorCa EC Members and Sirdars at our Chapter Holiday Party on Sunday, December 11. My husband, Barry, and I very much look forward to welcoming you to our home.

Since I last wrote, I have returned from my expedition to the Falkland Islands and South Georgia, on which I was lecturing on the history of the places we visited. Two aspects of recent history at South Georgia were very much in evidence — one good, one bad. On the positive side, about five years ago, the South Georgia government set out to eradicate the plague of rats that had infested the island since arriving with sealers more than two centuries ago. The project was a daunting one, to kill every single one of the tens (hundreds?) of thousands of rats on a 110-mile long island. Last year, however, the rat-eradication team declared success. The rats are gone. And the evidence we saw — the endemic South Georgia pipit, the most southerly song bird in the world, is now back on the main island, no longer restricted to the sanctuary from rats these birds had found on off-shore

islands. It was so wonderful to hear their song from the dozens I saw flitting about. This was something I had never experienced on my previous trips to South Georgia. The special places of the world can heal if given a chance. But then there's the negative. Nearly all the glaciers on South Georgia are in serious retreat from the effects of climate change. In some cases, glacial terminuses are now miles back from where they were only a few decades ago. This highly visible impact should concern everyone.

You may recall Chapter Vice Chair Steve Smith's report in our last newsletter about our effort to obtain non-profit status for our chapter. This is a quick update. We have now received approval from the IRS, but we're not quite there yet. We still have to complete the process with the state of California, something we could not do until the IRS had approved. Almost there! We'll keep you posted.

Finally, congratulations and welcome to the Northern California Chapter to the five newly elected or reinstated EC members and one student member in our area. Kimberly, Linda, Mary Beth, Richard, Simon, and Nate — we look forward to seeing you at many future NorCa events.
